You can make a difference in the health of our streams.

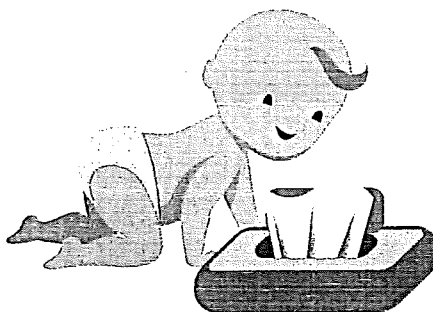
Reduce Yard Runoff

Compost grass clippings, and decrease use of fertilizer and pesticides. When it rains, these chemicals make their way to our streams.



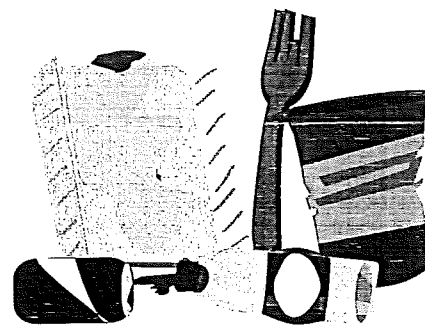
Don't Flush Wet Wipes

So-called "flushable wipes" do not break down properly in the sewer system. These wipes may clog sewer pipes and damage sewer line pumps.



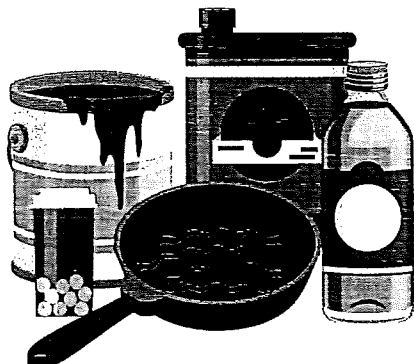
Clean Trash From Streams

Pick up litter or participate in a stream cleanup to help prevent trash from entering waterways.



Drains Are Only For Water

Don't pour fats, oils, grease, paint, petroleum products or medications into a catch basin, storm drain or a drain in your house. These can make fish sick and cause clogs in the pipes.



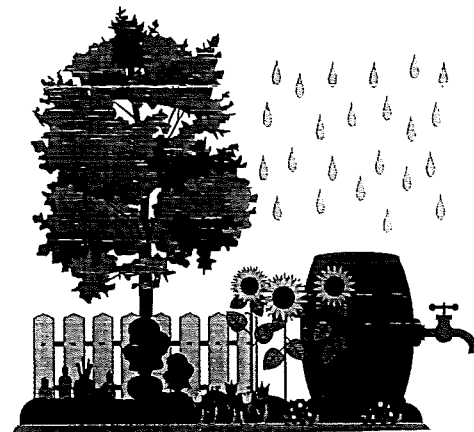
Clean Up After Your Pet

Dispose of pet waste in the trash so that it isn't washed down storm drains. Dogs in Jefferson County produce **four dump-truck loads** of waste every day.



Soak Up Extra Rainwater

Plant a tree, construct a rain garden, or replace your downspout with a rain barrel garden to help absorb stormwater.

Remember, Medicare plans can change each year

Important Medicare dates

September & October—Review & compare

Review: Your plan may change. Review any notices from your plan about changes for next year.

Compare: In October, use Medicare's tools to find a plan that meets your needs.

October 15—Open Enrollment begins

This is the one time of year when ALL people with Medicare can make changes to their health and prescription drug plans for the next year.

Decide: October 15 is the first day you can change your Medicare coverage for next year.

December 7—Open Enrollment ends

In most cases, December 7 is the last day you can change your Medicare coverage for next year. The plan has to get your enrollment request (application) by December 7.

January 1—Coverage begins

Your new coverage begins if you switched to a new plan. If you stay with the same plan, any changes to coverage, benefits, or costs for the new year will begin on January 1.

Making changes to your coverage after January 1

Between January 1–February 14, if you're in a Medicare Advantage Plan, you can leave your plan and switch to Original Medicare. If you switch to Original Medicare during this period, you'll have until February 14 to also join a Medicare Prescription Drug Plan to add drug coverage. Your coverage will begin the first day of the month after the plan gets your enrollment form.

LOST PET

Signs

Recently, a resident hosted a yard sale and posted bright, laminated signs giving the date, time, and location. The signs were posted the evening before the sale with duct tape to sign posts, light poles, and other public fixtures. The signs remained posted for 24 hours after the sale.

Recently, a resident posted free-standing signs regarding a lost pet. The signs were posted for 7 days and then removed.

It is our desire to balance communication within the City with the appearance of the City when signs are posted. Prior to the city council considering guidelines on posting of signs, let's agree how, when, and where signs may be posted within our city limits:

Signs should not be affixed to poles, posts, trees, or any other piece of public infrastructure. Posting by any method mars the finish of the object that the City has to maintain.

All signs posted must be free-standing, may be placed in public rights-of-way, and will be maintained/removed by the owner.

One-day event signs must be taken down within 4 hours of the end of the event. Signs looking for lost pets may be posted for up to 7 days. Please call the City Office to advise us that you plan to post signs.

All signs must include contact information or address of a resident.

Comments from our residents regarding signs will be heard at any city council meeting.

On another sign topic: If you notice that a street sign or traffic sign needs repair or replacement, please contact the city office with the details. Thanks!

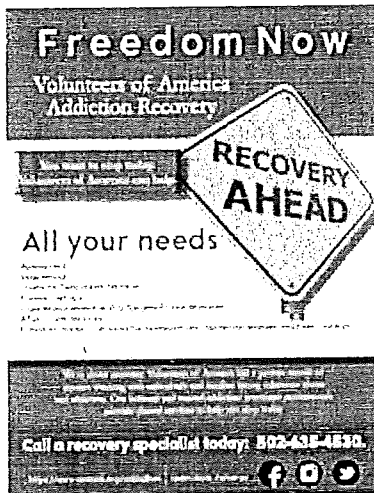

Addiction Recovery Services Available through Volunteers of America

Volunteers of America have recently opened new addiction recovery locations to better serve the community. They have several programs at 1436

South Shelby Street. Freedom House is a residential program for pregnant and parenting women. Shelby Men's Recovery Center is also

located on South Shelby. This is a 90 day residential program for men, where clients are able to work while seeking treatment. They have Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOP) and services for men, women and families.

These services are available at 2500 West Broadway and 4303 W Broadway. Transitional Housing will be available in July for homeless women with children who would like to continue their sobriety at 4303 W Broadway

If you know someone who may be interested in VOA's programs, please contact the intake office at 502-635-4530. They're able to do a quick screening, verify their insurance, and set up an intake date and time.

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Recently passed Senate Bill 6 went into effect as of July 14th and requires pharmacies to teach patients proper medication disposal techniques. Consumers may see signage on the doors of pharmacies or at the prescription counters. The following language is noted:



Safe Disposal of Medicines

To help reduce the chance that others may accidentally take or intentionally misuse unneeded or expired medications, you should dispose of them promptly when they are no longer needed.

Options include:

- **Medicine take-back programs**
- **Permanent collection sites**
- **Sequestration or deactivation devices**
- **Home disposal options under specific circumstances**

- **Medicine take-back programs** - may also be known as drug toss, expired drop toss, usually hosted by various community groups when the required law enforcement personnel can be on site. National Drug Take Back days are usually hosted twice yearly April and October.
- **Permanent collection sites** – May also be known as Drug Disposal Drop off centers, many of which are located at local police stations or health departments. Locations can be researched by county at <https://odcp.ky.gov/Pages/Prescription-Drug-Disposal-Locations.aspx>
- **Sequestration or deactivation devices** - Bags of special compounds to which consumers add unused and unwanted prescription drugs. When added together with water, the mix creates "goo" that makes the drugs impossible to use. The bag once activated with water and drugs can be thrown in the trash to breakdown safely.
- **Home disposal options under specific circumstances** - Certain medications require specific disposal for patient and environment safety. For specific information, visit the link below or ask the pharmacist providing you with the medication.

How to use the new easy disposal bags that pharmacies now have available:

1. Open the bag
2. Pour unwanted medications inside
3. Pour in warm water to a fill line
4. Securely seal the bag
5. Toss the bag in the trash can

Whatever route is chosen, remember that medications should never be flushed down the drain or toilet unless told to do so by your pharmacist or other healthcare provider.
